Student bus usage (IMPORTANT)

THIS WEEK ONLY: there is a bus driver shortage and because of this a couple of bus runs have to be condensed. Run #26 will be deleted and it will be Run #29. Students on Run #22 will be split up and put onto others runs—the bus drivers will assist as much as possible, please explain the above info with your child if they use these bus runs. Thank you.

Please be aware that First Canada, our busing contractor, and the School District are enforcing the rules with respect to student usage of buses. Students will only be transported to and from their primary residence or secondary residence if circumstances apply, with bus passes listing their proper routes on them. School buses will no longer be used for personal transportation requests such as, but not limited to: 1) appointments, 2) birthday parties, 3) going to friend's houses, etc. Parents and guardians will have to make their own

GRADE 2/3 (Mrs. K. Barr)

The grade 3-4 class will be having their first math test of the new year. A package of information and practice pages were sent home last week to help the students prepare. The test will be on numbers to 10,000, place value and comparing numbers.

To get ready for a science project, students have been asked to bring in shoe box-sized boxes. They will be used to make habitat dioramas. So far, we have learned about forests and ponds. Ask your child about the walk we took to the beaver pond last week.

In Art classes we have been learning about the stylized Japanese drawings called Manga. Ask your child to show you how to create the special eyes and facial expressions unique to this type of art.

GRADE SIX/SEVEN (Ms. Plewak)

Students need to stay on top of

their math homework and complete assignments on time. Any assignment marked "I" must be completed or it will turn into an "F". Daily assignments are worth 80% of the grade and tests 20%, so daily work is very important.

In Science we have started a unit on ecosystems and resource use, impacts of resource use and renewable energy alternatives. Students will be presenting their learning later this term with a poster.

In Language Arts the students are writing summaries using the main idea and supporting details as well as writing complete sentences and paragraphs.




Dear Parents and Guardians:


