GRADE 3/4 NEWS (Mrs. Barr)

The grade 3-4 class have been spending a lot of time **writing**. Using the story from the First Nations Library at Hazelton Secondary called <u>A Team Like No Other</u> by Georgia Graham, the boys and girls created one-word-notes in teams. They then used these notes to write paragraphs of information to summarize short sections of the book. Ask your child about **paragraphs**. What should they look like? What does indenting mean? How is an introductory paragraph different than the main body paragraphs? Why do we double space our work when writing rough copies?

Each student is now working on a **mapping project** in Social Studies. They have a list of criteria to include in their work as they create either a map of a room or a treasure map. Ask your child which type of map they are making. What features must they include on their map to meet the marking criteria (legend, title, scale, symbols, etc.)? Why is neatness important on this project?

In Mathematics, the students have been practicing their **multiplication skills** using games with dice and playing cards. Ask your child about the Spiral Multiplication game. I have sent home the instructions so that you can try it together.

Foundation Skills Assessment exams will begin on Monday, Jan. 26th for the grade 4 students. A schedule of times was sent home last week in their planners. All tests take place <u>before</u> recess each day, so please arrive promptly by at least 8:55 a.m. each day.

Weekly homework sheets have been sent home every Monday and they are due back, completed, by the following Monday. This week the sheet is printed on pink paper and asks the children to practice their multiplication skills using repeated addition sentences and arrays. Please, set aside some quiet time each night for your child to work on these homework sheets each night.

NEWS from GRADE 1/2 (Mrs. Hobenshield)

In writing we are working on our second guided comparative write. We compared police officers and fire persons. We will continue to work on comparative writing for the month of January.

In math both groups continue to practice building numbers using both addition and subtraction sentences. Our new concept is money: the students are practicing naming all the coins and making money amounts using the coins. This

skill uses counting by fives and tens.

We have Lily H and Amy G, in grade one, who have mastered the reading and writing of packs one and two. Sierre G, George M, Teagon J, Lily G, and Zechariah K, in grade two, who have mastered packs one and two as well. Good work!

In social studies we have completed our map of Canada. We will now be working on a map of British Columbia and then

moving on to what our responsibilities to the local environment might look like.

In health and careers we have classified jobs in several different ways. We will be looking at effective work habits.

REGISTRATION PROCEDURES FOR KINDERGARTEN

In preparation for the 2015 - 2016 school year, the Board of Education is seeking the cooperation of parents in registering their child on the following dates. If you have not already done so, preregistration is requested in order to provide the School District Administration the time to plan staffing to meet school needs.

SCHOOLS ARE OPEN TO TAKE REGISTRATION FOR KINDERGARTEN FROM 9:00 AM TO 12:00 PM & 1:00 PM TO 3:00 PM BETWEEN JANUARY 12, 2015 AND MARCH 6, 2015

The School District will make every effort to place students who have registered by March 6, 2015 in their catchment area school. Students registering after March 6, 2015 may not be granted a place in their catchment area school.

To be eligible for entry to school in September 2015 students must be **five years of age on or before December 31, 2015**. A birth certificate, proof of immunization and a BC Care Card will be required at the time of registration.

To register for Kindergarten classes, please register your child at your neighbourhood primary/elementary school.

FRENCH IMMERSION KINDERGARTEN AND GRADE ONE

- A student does not have to be of French origin to enrol in French Immersion.
- Registration for French Immersion Kindergarten and Grade One takes place at schools indicated with an *.
- Registration for French Immersion Grade One is for students presently attending Kindergarten in English, who would like to begin in the French Immersion Program.

NEW STUDENT REGISTRATION & CROSS BOUNDARY APPLICATION

School District 82 Policy 1030 outlines student attendance/catchment area procedures in accordance with Ministry of Education policies on *Schools of Choice*. It is important that parents take note of specific deadlines defined within this policy and ensure the procedures listed below are followed:

- 1. Students must be registered at their catchment area school.
- 2. Cross Boundary/Out-of-Catchment Applications: After registering at your catchment area school, applications must be received at your school of choice by February 16, 2015 for the 2015-2016 school year.
- 3. New In-Catchment Registrations: Registrations will be received up to March 6, 2015 for new students including Kindergarten. Applications received after this date will have to wait until school staffing is complete before receiving status of school enrolment. Wait-listed students who are in catchment area may be moved as soon as space is available.
- 4. Confirmation of Cross Boundary Applications: By the first Friday following school opening, September 11, 2015, or as soon as possible following this date, pending staffing allocations and school configurations. Unsuccessful applicants may be held on a waiting list for the subsequent school year.
- 5. Notification of In-Catchment: Wait-listed in-catchment area students will be notified of their status for the school year as soon as possible or by the first Friday following school opening.

Definitions:

- 1. Cross Boundary/Out-of-Catchment Students: Those students who do not live within the defined attendance areas for the school they wish to attend.
- 2. In-Catchment Students: Those students who live in the attendance areas defined for each school.

Inquiries regarding catchment areas should be directed to the principal of the school.

IMPORTANT REMINDERS

Dear Parents and Guardians:

- STUDENT BUS USAGE: Please be aware that First Canada, our busing contractor, and the School District are enforcing the rules with respect to student usage of bus-

es. Students will only be transported to and from their primary residence or secondary residence if circumstances apply, with bus passes listing their proper routes on them. School buses will no longer be used for personal transportation requests such as, but not limited to: 1) appointments, 2) birthday parties, 3) going to friend's houses, etc. Parents and guardians will have to make their own arrangements. Notes indicating such personal matters will no longer be accepted by the bus, bus drivers or by the

school staff. Also be advised that bus drivers do check your child's bus pass to see if they are on the correct bus, have a bus pass etc. IF your child has lost their bus pass please remind them to come to the front office and request a new one. Your child must have the correct bus pass to board the bus.

unteers are welcome, provided you have a completed Police Information Check on file at the school.



HELLO FROM KINDERGARTEN



For Your Information.....
